Rachel Maclean's new work Feed Me to premiere at British Art Show 8

A delirious confection of multi-layered digital images, whipped into even more extravagant form by the artist's trademark multi-character theatrics, Rachel Maclean's *Feed Me* is a parable of the pleasures and the perils of excess. Produced by Film and Video Umbrella, this is Maclean's most ambitious project to date: an intricate and audacious 60-minute film, scripted by the artist, and in which Maclean, made up to the hilt, and wrapped in various costumes and prosthetics, plays all the roles.

The characters she enacts run the gamut of contemporary obsessions, and personify much of the selfishness, avarice and indulgence of the times in which we live. Constantly changing guises, Maclean deftly nails (and wickedly skewers) some of these celebrated faces of today: the pre-teen social media addict, the starry-eyed child-performer, the silver-fox media entrepreneur, the entertainment industry svengali.

Part fairy tale, part hyper-modern fantasia, 'Feed Me' revels in its colourful, candy-coated surface but it also has caustic and satirical bite; lamenting the commercialisation (and sexualisation) of childhood, and a corresponding infantilism in adult behaviour. As we continue to feed the monster of contemporary consumerist desire, Maclean's film is a record of all the little monsters that are created in its wake.
